Course Requirements

Participation in discussion sections (good participation will be possible grounds for raising course grade, especially if it is on a borderline).

"Metaphysics exercises" (kind of a short take-home multiple choice quiz), due most class days (all exercises together are worth 35% of the final grade; graded heavily on a curve). These will be made available on-line via the "Tests & Quizzes" tool on ecommons. Since I'm not yet sure how many of these there will be, they are not yet listed on the syllabus: stay tuned via the on-line syllabus and/or eCommons to see when they are due.

Two short papers (2–3 pages), due Tues., Apr. 22 and Thurs., May 15 (worth 15% each of the final grade).

One longer paper (6–8 pages) (worth 35% of the final grade). The paper is due Tues., Jun. 10, but you must hand in an introductory paragraph and brief outline (approximately one sentence per paragraph of the proposed complete paper) at some time on or before Tues., Jun. 3. Your TA will send this back to you as soon as possible with suggested changes, which you should take into account. This preliminary assignment will not be separately graded, but if you do not hand it in at all or if it is wholly

unsatisfactory, your grade on the final paper will be reduced by one half step (e.g. A to A-).
