Please respond to the following question in approximately two pages (double spaced). (Needless to say this should be your own original work.)

In Ideas §32, Husserl makes a connection between "attempted doubt" and the peculiar modification or change in attitude which he ocalls $\epsilon \pi o \chi \dot{\eta}$ ($epoch\bar{e}$). On the other hand, he says that $\epsilon \pi o \chi \dot{\eta}$ is not exactly the same thing as Descartes's attempted doubt, because "in the attempt to doubt ... the 'excluding' is brought about in and with a modification of counter positing, namely the 'supposition' of non-being" (p. 59). In other words, Descartes's attempt to doubt, unlike Husserl's $\epsilon \pi o \chi \dot{\eta}$, involves $supposing\ that\ our\ original\ positing\ was\ wrong$. How, according to Husserl, is the proposed phenomenological $\epsilon \pi o \chi \dot{\eta}$ therefore related to (similar to and different from) Descartes's universal attempted doubt (in procedure, scope, and aim)?
