Please respond to the following question in approximately two pages (double spaced). (Needless to say this should be your own original work.)

In Ideas §32, Husserl makes a connection between "attempted doubt" and the peculiar modification or change in attitude which he calls  $\dot{\epsilon}\pi o\chi \dot{\eta}$  (epochē). On the other hand, he says that  $\dot{\epsilon}\pi o\chi \dot{\eta}$  is not exactly the same thing as Descartes's attempted doubt, because "in the attempt to doubt ... the 'excluding' is brought about in and with a modification of counter positing, namely the 'supposition' of non-being" (p. 59). In other words, the attempt to doubt, unlike the  $\dot{\epsilon}\pi o\chi \dot{\eta}$ , involves supposing that our original positing was wrong. How is Husserl's proposed phenomenological  $\tau$ herefore related to (similar to and different from) Descartes's universal attempted doubt (in procedure, scope, and/or aim)?
